Carolyn McKinstry is a native of Birmingham, Alabama, and is a frequent guest speaker in venues around the world, spreading her message of racial reconciliation.


Micah Pritchett is pastor of North Broad Baptist Church, Rome, Georgia, and is on Baptist Women in Ministry's Leadership Team.

THE 2019 DISTINGUISHED MENTOR AWARD

Baptist Women in Ministry recognizes and honors **Jay Kieve** as the recipient of the 2019 Frankie Huff Granger Distinguished Mentor Award.

Since March 2013, Jay has served as coordinator of Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of South Carolina, a position from which he has fiercely encouraged and advocated for women ministers. During his tenure, seven women

have been called as pastors by churches affiliated with CBF of South Carolina, and several of those women credit Jay with helping open doors into their churches and then encouraging and supporting them in their role as pastor.

Merianna Neely Harrelson, now pastor of Garden of Grace Church in Columbia, South Carolina, offers these words about Jay's role in her own ministerial journey: "As a third-year seminary student who had been told again and again that there just weren't congregations who were ready to call a woman to be their senior pastor, I was losing hope. . . . Then I met Jay Kieve. He believed that there were churches in South Carolina who would call a woman and who would call me. He helped make the connection to Emmanuel Baptist Fellowship, the community of faith that would call me to my first pastorate. He was eager to

help me to succeed by providing encouragement and guidance. He celebrated my call by sharing it in the state newsletter and with the greater BWIM community, urging other churches to see what a minister looks like."

Jennifer McClung Rygg, pastor of First Baptist Church of Pendleton, echoes this affirmation: "Jay has been very intentional about fostering a community of collegiality across gender lines, and his leadership is a great support for women in ministry. He has encouraged committees to consider women as candidates and is helping us move toward that becoming 'the norm.' Jay is a great resource and source of encouragement for women ministers."

Others in the state have also been the recipients of Jay's mentoring. Carrie Nettles, an ordained Baptist minister and a victim services specialist at the Julie Valentine Center in Greenville, writes, "I cannot imagine where my own call and path would be if not for his support, allyship, and leadership. Jay's leadership is ego-less, justice focused, and quite Jesusy in that every bit of power given to him he gives away to others."

Prior to his role at CBF of South Carolina, Jay was pastor and associate pastor of several churches in Alabama, North Carolina, and South Carolina. Dixie Ford, who served on staff with Jay at Crosscreek Baptist Church in Pelham, Alabama, writes, "He encouraged me to use my gifts, challenged me to take risks, and continues to support

my call to ministry even though we no longer work together. I am grateful that my three young daughters and my son were able to see their pastor completely affirm and encourage women in ministry."

Jay currently serves on the Clergy Sexual Misconduct Task Force, a joint partnership of Baptist Women in Ministry and the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. Stephen Reeves, co-chair of the task force and associate coordinator of partnerships and advocacy for Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, affirms, "Jay has been one of the most dedicated members of the task force and has contributed significantly to the resources created for churches. He is passionate, knowledgeable, and dedicated to prevention in our churches."

Jay's colleague and friend, Terri Byrd, coordinator of Alabama Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, writes, "Jay is an advocate for women in the most practical sense of the word . . . advocating for equal pay, equal time on the agenda, equal voices on the platform, and equal resumes that are handed over for potential job hires. He listens with open ears and heart and believes the stories that are told. I have seen him embrace workplace flexibility for ALL so that no one was singled out. He mentors with enthusiasm, honesty, and grace all of those who seek his guidance."

For his intentional efforts to mentor and advocate for women ministers, we give thanks to God for **Jay Kieve**.

2019 CHURCH OF **EXCELLENCE**

Over the years, many churches have supported Baptist Women in Ministry with prayers and contributions and have nurtured the faith of girls and women, affirmed women's callings and giftedness, blessed and ordained women as ministers, called women to serve in their midst, and sent women out to serve in the world. The Church of Excellence recognition is BWIM's way of saying thank you each year to one church, a church that has gone above and beyond in its encouragement and support.

This year, with much gratitude, Baptist Women in Ministry honors Baptist Church of the Covenant (BCOC), Birmingham, Alabama, as the 2019 Church of Excellence. Founded in 1970, BCOC was birthed during Birmingham's fight for desegregation. That year a young African-American girl, Twila Fortune, and her mother, Winifred Bryant, asked to become members of the all-white First Baptist Church of Birmingham. The third time that the church refused them membership almost 300 members along with the pastor, J. Herbert Gilmore, walked out.

With nowhere to go, the "Company of the Committed," as they called themselves, were welcomed by a nearby reform Jewish congregation, Temple Emmanu-el, to worship in their sanctuary on Sundays at 9 a.m. The "company" soon founded Baptist Church of the Covenant, which was constituted on December 20, 1970. Three years later, the congregation bought land on Birmingham's southside and has remained there, committed to serving in an urban area.

While worshiping at the Temple, members of the new church created a list of congregational commitments that continue to be read each time a new member is presented, including: "Anyone who desires to worship Jesus Christ is welcome." Since their founding, BCOC has lived out this call to radical hospitality. They host a weekly community meal that draws those who are homeless, hold a Sunday morning class for children with developmental disabilities, and offer a van ministry to help the elderly and disabled living in a federally subsidized apartment building buy groceries.

A supporter of women in leadership since its founding, BCOC voted in 1974 for the inclusion of women in their deacon body, and the congregation ordained its first women deacons in 1975: Nadine Gordon, Marian Norris, and Virginia Ogle. In 1978, BCOC ordained charter member and deacon, Aline Fuselier, to the gospel ministry. During the 1980s-90s, as one



of the few churches in the area that affirmed the ministry gifts of women, the congregation welcomed women into the pulpit and ordained a good number of women as ministers.

In 2002, the church called Sarah Jackson Shelton as pastor. While the church's embrace of Sarah was overwhelmingly affirmative, her calling was criticized publicly as Sarah was one of the first women called to pastor an Alabama Baptist church. During her tenure, she mentored numerous Samford University students as well as the women ministers who have served on the BCOC's staff, many of whom are pastors and leaders throughout the world. In 2018, Sarah was as a mentor for four new pastors for Baptist Women in Ministry's Mentoring Program. On April 28, 2019, after nearly seventeen years of faithfully pastoring BCOC, Sarah retired from church ministry. In this transitional season, Rodney Franklin is the interim pastor, and Valerie Burton, associate pastor for Christian formation and a staff minister since 2008, continues to offer congregational leadership.

Baptist Women in Ministry celebrates Baptist Church of the Covenant's commitment to the work of the gospel, its generous and faithful support of our organization, and its affirmation and support of women ministers. Today with much excitement we recognize Baptist Church of the Covenant as the 2019 Church of Excellence!

THE **2019 ADDIE DAVIS** AWARDS

Since 1998, Baptist Women in Ministry has recognized exceptional Baptist women seminarians through the presentation of the Addie Davis Award for Outstanding Leadership in Pastoral Ministry and the Addie Davis Award for Excellence in Preaching. The awards are an affirmation of all the women nominated as well as recognition of the award recipients.

The 2019 recipient of the Addie Davis Award for Outstanding Leadership in Pastoral Ministry is Julianna Marraccino. Originally from California, Julianna first experienced God's call to ministry while on a mission trip to Kenya during her freshman year of high school. Desiring to study religion, Julianna attended Baylor University for her undergraduate degree and remained at Baylor for graduate work in theology and social work. She currently has completed three years of a fouryear program pursing a Master of Divinity degree from George W. Truett Theological Seminary and a Master of Social Work degree from the Diana R. Garland School of Social Work. "In bringing together these two fields," she says, "I see the scriptural truths and callings lived out in

caring for others and the community in a way that considers the whole of a person, the systems within communities, and the values of seeing every individual as one who is made in the image of God."

In addition to a rigorous course load, Julianna has served as resident chaplain for the largest resident hall on campus, ministering to 600 freshman women by holding one-on-one meetings with students and staff members, leading Bible studies and other events, and providing pastoral care for those experiencing health, academic, relational and spiritual crises.

In between semesters, Julianna has engaged in cross-cultural internships and classes in Kenya and Zambia. She hopes to use her experiences and education to engage churches and communities through cross-cultural engagement, building meaningful partnerships, and glorifying God through service and witness with others.

For the past seven years, Julianna has been an active youth ministry volunteer at Highland Baptist Church in Waco, developing and teaching lessons, leading small groups, and participating in high school mission trips. She also has been a strong advocate for homeless and unaccompanied high school students in Waco.

Andrew Arterbury, associate professor of Christian Scriptures at Truett, writes of Julianna: "I recall a fifty-year-old Zambian woman (an undergraduate student at Northrise University) whom we asked to provide a word of exhortation in front of the thirty-five-person class that consisted of American and Zambian students-both males and females. When the woman hesitated to speak in front of the group, Julianna said, 'I'll stand beside you as you speak.' The woman, with a great deal of nervousness, walked to the front of the room and gave voice to a profound word from God—a word that we would have missed had Julianna not stepped in.... God uses her humble courage to meet people where they are and help them live more fully into God's call upon their lives."

The recipient of the 2019 Addie Davis Award for Excellence in Preaching is **Andrea Huffman**, a student in Central Baptist Theological Seminary's Women's Leadership Initiative. She is a graduate of Fuller Theological Seminary and Howard Payne University and since 2016 has served as youth pastor at Chandler Baptist Church in Liberty, Missouri.

Andrea preached for the first time in February 2012 for a Texas church's observance of Baptist Women in Ministry's

Month of Preaching. One vocal member of the congregation declared that having a woman in the pulpit was blasphemous, and he and other members walked out of the service before Andrea preached. Reflecting upon that difficult experience, Andrea wrote: "That day changed my life, not because of all of the drama but because—even in the midst of it—I loved every second of standing up in front of my church family and delivering the message that God had laid on my heart. I felt a confirmation in my spirit that preaching was going to be a regular part of my life and ministry, and this confirmation was accompanied by a supernatural sense of peace and fulfillment."

Amy Mears, Andrea's homiletics professor at Central, writes: "Andrea brings good sense, authenticity, and integrity into the pulpit. She develops sermons with particular care. . . . She is direct, natural, engaged and connectional. Those watching and listening have a sense that Andrea is, in fact, bringing good news—to them." Margaret Ann Black, a member of Andrea's church, shares: "I grew up believing that women should not be preachers. After getting to know Andrea as a person and



hearing her preach, I have changed my mind. Old mindsets are hard to change, but Andrea has done that! Andrea captures the attention of the audience through various creative elements and then holds their attention as she works her way through scripture."

Andrea's award-winning sermon, "Together We Sing," is based on Mary's Magnificat in Luke 1:39-55. In this sermon, preached on March 3, 2019, at Chandler Baptist Church, Andrea proclaimed: "Elizabeth sees Mary, and immediately blesses her. Elizabeth acknowledges the truth of Mary's circumstances, even as unbelievable as they may seem. Elizabeth humbles herself before Mary, lifting up Mary as a woman of worth and value. Elizabeth commends Mary for her faith. For the first time since this thing happened, Mary finds herself affirmed, and believed, and praised for her belief in the future fulfillment of the promise of God. She finds herself known, and not alone. And only then does Mary sing. . . . only then was Mary able to sing."



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MY FIRST TIME **PREACHING**

In a small, beat-up old box I have notes, cards, and other important keepsakes. Among these is a copy of the first sermon I preached: "All Things Work Together," based on Romans 8. It is from the Youth Sunday of my sophomore year of high school, and I can still feel the butterflies in my stomach. The word BREATHE, written in at the top of each page by Ruth Perkins Lee, my youth minister, reminds me of the awkward pace at which I preached it: speeding up rapidly and then . . . suddenly . . . a big gulp of air. Slow down. BREATHE. Repeat.

It was not only the pace that was awkward. In my sermon, I shared a detailed account of my journey to seventh place in the Leaf and Tree Finder event for elementary school Science Olympiad, I quoted from the Merriam-Webster dictionary a grand total of three times, and my reference to "groaning as in the pains of childbirth" (Romans 8:22) sounded a lot more like teenage angst (but perhaps that is indeed what it sounds like sometimes).

Honestly, I used to feel a bit embarrassed when reading back over that sermon, cringing at the forced metaphors and less-than-nuanced theology. Now, however, I am anything but embarrassed. Awkward or not, when I read over those words I spent so much time preparing, I am proud of my fourteen-year-old self and the journey she has taken to get from there to here. Those words remind me of all I learned in the process: of what I learned about preaching, like it helps to tell stories and perhaps is best not to so blatantly articulate that "my first point will be..." But even more importantly, I am reminded of the lessons that I did not even realize that I was learning at the time. I learned that I can occupy space in the pulpit and that young people, women people, ALL people, should be valued as full participants in worship. I read over that sermon, and I am overwhelming grateful for the people who taught me those lessons; for the faces that looked back at me as I nervously gripped the pulpit: my family, who has always supported my calling; the community who told me I could do it; and the women, the preachers, who showed me that I could. In that awkward sermon, I see fourteen-year-old me who wanted, more than anything else, to be a minister. I see the teenage girl who knew that not everyone thought women could preach but who hadn't yet felt the sting of that reality.

So now, on the days when I do feel that sting or impostor syndrome threatens my confidence or I feel overwhelmingly cynical, I remember that fourteen-year-old me. I read over "All Things Work Together," and I remember the eagerness and tenacity with which I approached my call to ministry. I close my eyes and see those faces looking back me, and I remember the people I had then and I think of the people I have now . . . those who have supported me, loved me, and challenged me. I picture the other youth who preached and sang and read alongside me that Sunday, and I remember that I have a responsibility to empower the fourteenyear-olds of today to proclaim themselves as full participants in our worship and in our world.

So for an experience that emboldened me then and, now, helps me remember, I give all the thanks.

THE BWIM WEBSITE

The BWIM website is packed full of resources, including information about Martha Stearns Marshall Month of Preaching, the Addie Davis Awards, the Clergy Sexual Misconduct Task Force's work, and a resource page, which includes maternity leave policies, ordination and installation service resources, ministry search and personnel helps, state and regional BWIM contact information, and a list of helpful books and articles.

CLERGY SEXUAL MISCONDUCT TASK FORCE

In October 2018, BWIM and the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship's joint Clergy Sexual Misconduct Task Force released two significant resources developed for use by churches, seminaries and partnering organizations. Safe Churches and Ministers is an educational video that introduces this tough topic and provides much-needed definitions, statistics and stories that are designed to help churches, students and leaders take seriously their responsibility in preventing abuse. It is accompanied by a leader guide and discussion guide, and is available in both English and Spanish. Clergy Sexual Abuse Prevention Recommendations for Churches is a collection of prevention guidelines and documents intended to prompt congregations to create their own policies, procedures, processes and covenants. Both videos and written resources are available at bwim.info/safechurches/

DISCERNMENT RETREATS

Each year BWIM hosts discernment events for college and seminary women. These events create intentional space for college women to reflect on God's calling. On September 20-22,

2019, BWIM and Texas BWIM will co-host a Discernment Retreat at Willow Meadows Baptist Church in Houston, Texas. Visit the BWIM website for more information.

MINISTRY SEARCH RESOURCES

BWIM offers resources and assistance both to churches searching for a minister and ministers searching for a new position. Included in the monthly enewsletter is a list of current openings, and resources are provided on the website for both churches and candidates. Both churches and candidates in need of assistance may submit information, job descriptions, and resumes via BWIM's Ministry Search Registration Forms.

MONTH OF PREACHING

BWIM sponsored the first Martha Stearns Marshall Month of Preaching in 2007! That year, 54 churches participated and invited a woman to preach during February. In 2019, 204 churches participated. Over the past twelve years, hundreds of churches have celebrated Martha's influence and example, and this year BWIM redreamed this emphasis and widened its circle by featuring, in addition to Martha, three other significant Baptist preachers: Ella Pearson Mitchell, Helen Barrett Montgomery and Edna Lee de Gutiérrez. We are grateful for the 204 churches that participated and publicly voiced their support of women in ministry, stood with other Baptist churches in celebrating the calling and gifts of women, and reminded their congregations that God does indeed call women to the work of the kingdom. LIVING INTO THE VISION

have in recent weeks been re-reading BWIM's founding documents. (Some people binge-watch movies on Netflix in their spare time, I pull out dusty papers and binders of old newsletters and binge-read). One of

the documents that I keep coming back to was written in 1983 by Nancy Sehested.

Nancy had a vision, one shared by the thirty-two other women who gathered on March 20, 1983 in Louisville, Kentucky. At this meeting, she presented an address in which she set forth a vision for a new organization. This organization would encourage women to fuller ministries in churches and in the denomination; provide an avenue for sharing "the joys and struggles as disciples of Christ;" instill in women courage, insight, and strength; and explore, discuss, and form new paradigms of leadership, paradigms that encourage empowerment rather than control. And with those words Baptist Women in Ministry was birthed.

Thirty-six years later the organization lives on. The executive director in me takes great pride in knowing that BWIM survived lean years and hard times and now is thriving. The historian in me (the one who loves reading through dusty founding documents) is grateful to those thirty-three women who dreamed the dreams AND who also kept good records. The strategic thinker in me ponders about how well BWIM has lived into Nancy's vision.

In these past four decades, Baptist women have indeed been encouraged to fuller ministries in churches and in denominations. In the early 1980s, fourteen women served as pastors of Southern Baptist churches. In 2019, just over 200 women serve as pastors or co-pastors in churches that affiliate with the Alliance of Baptists, the Baptist General Association of Virginia, the Baptist General Convention of Texas, the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, and the District of Columbia Baptist Convention. Progress

for Baptist women pastors has been slow but steady in these past thirty-six years. In 2019, Baptist women are also seminary professors and president; hospital, military, and prison chaplains; executives of non-profit organizations; and denominational leaders. Baptist women are flourishing in fuller ministries than even dreamed about in 1983!

Every day I hear stories and see social media posts that tell me that Baptist women ministers in 2019 are sharing "the joys and struggles as disciples of Christ." Baptist women ministers gather in peer groups, mentoring groups, study groups. They go together on retreats, pilgrimages, and fun adventures. They attend each other's weddings, host baby showers for one another, and show up on the hard days for a ministry friend. For all that social media isn't, it IS a beautiful way to share joys and struggles.

Measuring progress when it comes to instilling in women courage, insight, and strength seems like an impossible task. There are no numbers, no graphs or charts, no visuals that point to BWIM's success in giving courage, insight, and strength to women ministers. But oh my there are stories that convince me that Baptist women in 2019 are courageous and insightful and strong.

Nancy's final challenge for a new organization was that it explore, discuss, and form new paradigms of leadership, paradigms that encourage empowerment rather than control. And this is where I had to stop and ask some questions. Has BWIM in this past thirty-six years helped shape new leadership paradigms, or are Baptists still stuck in traditional patriarchal leadership modes? Has BWIM challenged Baptists to work more collaboratively and to welcome all the voices at the table? Has BWIM empowered women to believe in themselves, to embrace their giftedness, and to step fully into their callings? I know deep in my heart that there is still much work to be done for BWIM to live fully into its founding vision, but I am ever thankful for Nancy's capturing words that continue to challenge, inspire, and push us forward in this work.


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
