ADDIE DAVISAWARD WINNERS



Cheri Mills is the 2022 recipient of the Addie Davis Award for Outstanding Leadership in Pastoral Ministry. With 29 years of ministry experience, Cheri is a church administrator, the founder of an ecumenical prayer movement, the author of three books, a student at Baptist Seminary of Kentucky (BSK), and a fierce advocate for social and racial justice.



Cheri Mills


Cheri has been involved in the church since she was a child, and was strongly influenced by her mother and her grandparents who modeled their devotion to God through their selfless love in service to others. Following their example, Cheri has served as church administrator since 1993 for St. Stephen Baptist Church in Louisville, Kentucky, where she led the expansion of the church from one campus to three campuses across two states.

Kevin Cosby, senior pastor at St. Stephen writes, "Cheri is the highest ranking Black female church administrator in the Commonwealth of Kentucky." He continues stating that Cheri's "influence and impact extend beyond church duties and programs. She has been a positive influence in the lives of many believers through prayer, counseling,

mentoring, and modeling. She is highly respected by religious and community leaders, as well as persons from every standing in life."

Cheri has focused her ministry efforts through prayer. She discovered her passion for prayer ministry in a season of darkness when she suffered from panic attacks and was often fearful of her surroundings. In this time of mental upheaval, she prayed to God constantly and felt strengthened by God through prayer. She writes, "God fanned a flame of fire in my heart for prayer." That flame grew into a passionate and purposeful ministry through Cheri's founding of the 1 Voice Prayer Movement, which connects churches in prayer with an emphasis on social and racial justice.

Additionally, in 2019, Cheri led efforts for a national observance of 400 years of institutional slavery in the United States in conjunction with the Angela Project and Simmons College. Her work included writing a prayer book for 40 days of prayer leading up to a national commemoration ceremony which was streamed live from St. Stephen for thousands to participate. She also wrote a commemoration ceremony booklet which has been widely received by churches across the US.



These two books are entitled,
The Angela Project Presents: 40 Days
of Prayer for the Liberation of The
American Descendants of Slavery,
and The Angela Project Presents: The
400th Year Commemoration Ceremony,
Commemorating 400 Years of Slavery in
America. Then, in 2021, Cheri published
her third book titled, Lent of Liberation:
Confronting the Legacy of American
Slavery, which has become a study tool
for hundreds of ministers.

Her work during the 400th Year commemoration, which guided Black and white leaders across different faith traditions toward confession of historical and institutional sin, was so powerful that it was featured in the New York Times.

In 2017, Mills began pursuing a Master of Divinity degree at BSK. Professor of Theology, Mark Medley, describes Mills as "a strong and wise leader in the classroom. She is pastorally present to her peers, constantly encouraging a fellow student's academic work and practice of ministry. Cheri also exercises prophetic pastoral leadership by her fierce commitment to racial justice." About her own studies and call to ministry, Mills writes, "Just as God called Paul to be an apostle of Christ, I believe that God has called me out to the ministry of intercession with Christ. It is my belief that when we begin to pray, we join Christ who is already in prayer."



Angela Zimmerman

Angela Zimmerman is the recipient of the 2022 Addie Davis Award for Excellence in Preaching. She is a student at Central Baptist Seminary and serves as Minister of Music and Associate Pastor at First Baptist Church of Danville, Virginia. During the pandemic, opportunities to preach became more frequent for Angela. And although she was hesitant at first to see herself as a preacher, she grew into the role as a natural communicator with pastoral presence.

Angela's gift for preaching is well-recognized among those who hear her sermons. Joshua Hearne, director of Grace and Main Fellowship, writes, "Angela seems to have an innate understanding of the effect and capacity of careful and attentive preaching upon not only a congregation but upon herself and her peers as well."

One of Angela's professors at Central, Wallace Hartfield II, writes, "Simply stated, the effort, time, and creativity she put into preparation for each of the sermons I heard her preach were thoughtful and challenging."

Angela Barker Jackson, who served as Angela's mentor and is Director Development at Central, writes of the award-winner's preaching, "From the beginning I was keenly aware of Angela's extraordinary thoughtfulness and sharp intellect, but it was her beautiful pastoral imagination that captivated me."

On July 11, 2021, Angela preached the award-winning sermon "The Lowly Mustard Seed" at FBC Danville. Her sermon began by asking congregants to imagine holding something in the palm of their hands and imagine it getting smaller until it was the size of an almost invisible mustard seed.



As she drew congregants into the metaphor of the miniscule mustard seed growing into the kingdom of God, she stated, "When you live counterculturally with love, joy, peace, and patience you are planting kingdom seeds. When you show kindness, goodness, and faithfulness you are planting kingdom seeds. When you show self-control and gentleness you are planting kingdom seeds. When your actions show that you love your neighbor as much as you love yourself, kingdom seeds are being planted."

At the end of the sermon, she returned congregants' imagination to the seed that was in their hand and stated, "Jesus tells us that this mustard seed, a nearly invisible seed, when it is planted as a kingdom seed, will grow to encompass all of creation. It will be large enough for the birds of the air, and God's people, to live and find rest in the Kingdom of God. For this we can say, "Thanks be to God."

Offering the highest praise, Angela Barker Jackson recalled a time when she watched a video of Angela's preaching and shared, "Her message spoke so directly to my own heart during that season of grief and disconnectedness. My first thought and remark at the conclusion of the video were simple. 'Angela, I wish you were my pastor.'"

THE 2022 DISTINGUISHED MENTOR AWARD



DR. SOPHIA STEIBEL 2022 Frankie Huff Granger Distinguished Mentor Award

Baptist Women in Ministry recognizes and honors **Dr. Sophia Steibel** as the recipient of the 2022 Frankie Huff Granger Distinguished Mentor Award.

Dr. Steibel serves as Professor of Christian Education and Spiritual Formation at Gardner-Webb Divinity School in Boiling Springs, NC, where she has been teaching since 2001.

A native of Brazil, she has also served on the faculty of Gardner-Webb University, as director of Campinas Baptist Theological College, Campinas, Sao Paulo, Brazil, and on the faculties of South Brazil Baptist Theological Seminary and Baptist Religious Education Institute in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Dr. Steibel was nominated by three of her former and current students.

Sarah Blosser Blackwell shared, "Dr. Steibel embodies all this award hopes to recognize. In the past, some female mentors I had pushed and pushed for me to achieve higher status and reach for lofty positions without really listening to what I wanted for my life. Dr. Steibel

always honored and recognized the boundaries that I had prayerfully set on balancing my career and my family. She never made me feel less than for not having aspirations to pastor a megachurch and supported my non-traditional path into writing after my graduation."

Jennifer Jennings, Associate Pastor to Children and Families at First Baptist Church, Marion, NC, writes, "Dr. Steibel cares very deeply about all her students, but in particular, she cares about her female students, especially those who are struggling with a sense of calling and purpose. She has this prophetic wisdom that truly touches the lives of her students and empowers them."

Jennifer also shared about Dr. Steibel's influence in her beloved Sunday School class for women at First Baptist Church Shelby, NC. "The women in her class came away spiritually nourished and whole. In fact, I knew several women in the congregation who deeply depended on her class each week. They would miss worship, but they wouldn't miss Dr. Steibel's Sunday school class."

Jennifer concluded her comments by adding, "Although Dr. Steibel prefers to remain in the background on most things, her behind the scenes work supporting the women at Gardner-Webb and at her church has offered life-changing possibilities for these women. I think Dr. Steibel would be very shocked and surprised to even be nominated for this award, and yet I don't think anyone deserves it more."

A current Doctor of Ministry student, Kelly Settlemyre, Minister of Music and Education at Spencer Baptist Church in Spindale, NC, shared a personal story from her coursework with



Dr. Steibel as her DMin supervisor. After turning in a draft of her project, which she had great uncertainty toward, Dr. Steibel took the time to give a multitude of comments answering questions and providing direction and encouragement on multiple drafts.

Kelly wrote, "I turned in a draft feeling defeated and came out with a project I can celebrate. She didn't have to do any of that. How many professors take rough drafts of assignments and help students improve before being graded? Well, she does! Isn't that what a mentor is all about?"

In her other comments, Kelly stated, "I experienced her encouragement as I wrestled with my call to ministry. She helped me name and then claim my unique gifts and my calling without apology. She helped me to focus on who God created me to be, not on who other people might think I should be. Dr. Steibel didn't teach me to be a woman in ministry, she taught (and is still teaching) me how to be a minister who is a woman. And that makes all the difference!"

For her intentional, humble, and Spirit-led efforts to mentor, nurture, and advocate for women ministers, Baptist Women in Ministry gives thanks to God for Sophia Steibel.



2022 CHURCH OF **EXCELLENCE**

The recipient of the 2022 BWIM Church of Excellence Award is **Glendale Baptist Church** in Nashville, Tennessee.

In her nomination letter, longtime member of Glendale, Frenchie Fortenberry, described the early days of Glendale's pioneering actions in affirming and elevating women in leadership. Bold moves were taken to implement changes in congregational leadership which cultivated an environment of inclusion and equality. These changes paved the way for the calling of Rev. April Baker as associate pastor in 2002, and soon after as interim pastor.

Glendale's commitment to inclusion through the leadership of Rev. Baker meant it faced challenges and withdrawal from the Nashville Baptist Association and Tennessee Baptist Convention. But unwavering in its values, Glendale took the next pioneering step by calling Rev. Baker to serve as co-pastor with Rev. Dr. Amy Mears in 2004. After this move, Glendale's ministerial staff was comprised of all women, and the congregation adopted a moniker to describe themselves—Glendale Baptist Church, a caring community of equality and grace.

By taking early steps to put equality into practice, Glendale has become a place that seeks to provide support and mentorship for other women in ministry

who have limited opportunities to learn from experienced women ministers and in an empowering environment.

Tambi Swiney, an ordained minister and member of Glendale, shared, "As a small congregation, Glendale Baptist Church has an outsized reach and a rich legacy. This faith community's ongoing commitment to nurturing the gifts of girls and women and providing opportunities for them to serve is unparalleled."

Glendale's reach and legacy has included 24 "Glenterns" (seminary students serving as pastoral interns), 22 of which have been women.

Kelly Moreland Jones, a recent Glentern, shared, "The warm welcome and the openness with which Amy and April discuss the particular challenges experienced by women in ministry has been a pivotal part of my personal growth and development. I wish I could find the words to communicate the feeling of this place. For me, it's wrapped up in [many things including] the tears as I saw myself for the first time in a robe and stole preaching behind a pulpit."

Glendale's reach as a teaching congregation even extends to Cuba through its partnership with Iglesia Bautista Alberto J. Diaz in Santa Clara, Cuba, which is pastored by a woman. Furthermore, the congregation supplemented the salaries of the pastors in the Fraternity of Baptist Churches of Cuba, many of whom are also women.

Rev. Baker shared of Glendale, "When the church added "a Caring Community of Equality and Grace" to its name, Glendale easily could have included words like adventurous, risk-taking, intentional, and deeply committed to the Way of Love. Maybe they didn't need to say those things explicitly. Those characteristics are

evident in the life of this community in myriad ways."

Rev. Dr. Mears also added, "Glendale called two 40-year-old female-identifying co-pastors and have consistently provided space for us to figure out how pastoral ministry looks for us. And for them! We've been able to re-draw our boundaries together and to create new ways of being in community."

For their risk-taking and pioneering actions in elevating women in ministry, and their commitment to building a safe, inclusive, and empowering environment for women in leadership, Baptist Women in Ministry is delighted to honor Glendale Baptist Church as the 2022 BWIM Church of Excellence.

he 2021 State of Women in Baptist Life report was published and presented via webinar in June of this year. This report, released every five years, reveals the experiences of women in ministry and the statistics of how many women are serving in and preparing for ministry.

The 2021 report revealed that, while

The 2021 report revealed that, while women have made progress in almost all areas, advancement for women in ministry in the last 6 years has been minimal. BWIM celebrates all the women who are counted and whose perspectives are highlighted in the pages of the report. However, the report also calls for Baptist repentance and action in response to the reality that women continue to experience barriers to ministry.

After reading the report, several women in ministry wrote responsive articles in Baptist News Global. Senior pastor, Hannah Coe, wrote "Behind the women represented in each statistic is a community of faith, a part of Christ's body, wounded by the sin of misogyny, ingrained prejudice against women, and robbed of the experience of full healing in Christ."

Seminary student, Madison Boboltz wrote, "In preparing for these obstacles [in ministry], I also am preparing for a promising future in which women in leadership positions know their worth and are not afraid to advocate for themselves. We will not let those who interrupt our callings have the final say."

Thankfully, the statistics of the report do not have the final say on the future of women in ministry. The report is merely the beginning—a yard stick to help Baptists measure where we are and to better understand where we need to go. BWIM has created two additional resources to help Baptists respond to the report with action.

The first is a reading guide for women in

ministry, which invites women to reflect on their own experiences in light of the report's findings. This guide, called "A Community of Women" reminds those in ministry that they are not alone in their positive experiences nor in the obstacles they face, and their work is invaluable to the community of God and the ministry of the gospel. The reading guide also invites women to consider their own ministry contexts and ways they might help promote the empowerment of other women in their communities.



The second resource is a discussion guide for any group of people who support women in ministry. The resource, called "Bridging the Gap," encourages groups to notice the gap in their communities between what is professed about women in ministry and what is practiced. Group members will read the 2021 report contextually by considering how the data from the report may be reflected in their own communities and how they might better foster environments where women are able to thrive in ministry.

BWIM is grateful to all the women who are included in the 2021 report and for all Baptists who are committed to respond to the report's findings with action. With great hope we look to a future where all women are empowered and able to thrive in ministry settings. BWIM BOOK CLUB

CLERGY SEXUAL MISCONDUCT TASK FORCE

The Clergy Sexual Misconduct Task Force, a joint initiative between the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship and BWIM, is partnering with G.R.A.C.E. (Godly Response to Abuse in Christian Environments) to provide abuse prevention and response training for congregations. Resources for abuse prevention education created by the task force also continue to be available on both CBF's and BWIM's websites. If your congregation would like more information
