

The 1999 Addie Davis Preaching Award winner, **VERONICE MILES** is assistant professor of homiletics and Christian education at Wake Forest University Divinity School. A native of Florida, she earned degrees in psychology and counselor education from the University of Florida in Gainesville, received a Master of Divinity degree at Candler School of Theology, Emory University, and completed a doctorate of philosophy degree in Christian education and homiletics at Emory University.

An ordained Baptist minister, Veronice's experience in the academy is augmented by her ministry with local church communities and religious organizations, including serving as minister of Christian education and interim pastor at the Greater Bethany Baptist Church, Atlanta, Georgia.

After ten years as a lawyer moonlighting as a comedian, Susan left her practice and spent two years on a solo trip around the world, including working with Mother Teresa's mission in Calcutta, climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro, and driving the Alaska Highway. Upon returning home, she entered Union Theological Seminary in New York City, where she earned a Master of Divinity degree.

Susan is the pastor of Madison Avenue Baptist Church in New York City, and the church's first woman in its 162-year history. Susan has been featured in *O* (The Oprah) Magazine, the *New York Times*, on ABC and CNN. Her book, *LaughYour Way to Grace: Reclaiming the Spiritual Power of Humor*, was released in May 2010.

MARTHA STEARNS MARSHALL MONTH OF PREACHING, 2011

For five years now, Baptist Women in Ministry has sponsored Martha Stearns Marshall Month of Preaching, asking that Baptist churches participate in this special emphasis by having a woman preach during the month of February. This annual event has been a deeply significant source of joy and discovery for many women and churches.

Martha Stearns Marshall Month 2011 already has generated some amazing stories, including the participation of churches in Cuba and Indonesia. The Spring issue of *Vocare* will include some of those stories as well as a list of participating churches and their preachers.

Looking back over the years that we have had this emphasis, two questions seem to be asked each year: What if my church is just not ready to have a woman in the pulpit? and What if my church has women in the pulpit all the time?

If you church has never had a woman preach, my hope is that you can prayerfully and thoughtfully take small steps and help move your church toward being open. I have some suggestions, so e-mail me if you want to discuss ways to lead your church in inviting a woman into its pulpit AND I would love to hear stories from those of you who have been through this process and whose churches now welcome women preachers.

For churches that have a woman pastor or that often have women preach, this event is a great opportunity for you! This is an opportunity for your church to stand with and support Baptists who are still hoping for and dreaming of the day that their church will have a woman preach. Your church can publicly voice your support of women in ministry, be counted with other Baptist churches in celebrating the calling and gifts of women, and be reminded that God does indeed call women to the work of the kingdom. In the past, Baptist Women in Ministry has proposed that Martha Stearns Marshall Month could be an opportunity for churches pastored by women or with women frequently in their pulpits to invite a woman who has never had the opportunity to preach. Use this emphasis to encourage and support a first-time preacher.

Connie Stinson, pastor of Luther Rice Memorial Baptist Church in Silver Spring, Maryland, offered another suggestion. For churches with women pastor, Martha Stearns Marshall Month can be an opportunity for pulpit exchange with a church whose senior pastor is male. His church can then have a woman-led worship service, and her church could have a service led by a man who is a strong advocate of women in ministry. Connie notes that a pulpit exchange would be "an exercise in affirmation for both churches."

PLAYING CHURCH IN HIGH HEELS

My daughters, ages four and seven, were playing quietly. Too quietly. As I peeked around the corner, I saw Audrey, my youngest, wearing her sparkly high heels while standing on her step stool. From a big book, she was 'reading', "Jesus was born. Mary was his mother. God was happy. You should love Jesus." Then Eve leapt from the floor and started lining up communicants. She got all these imaginary worshippers in line and said, "First some questions: 'Do you love Jesus? Will you be a good member of this church?' Okay, now we can take communion." I slipped away unobserved, but like Mary I pondered these things in my heart.

I wondered, "Where did the girls hear these words and why did they couple them together in this way?" Upon reflection, I recognized the words and rituals from our worship service over the past few months. Audrey was retelling the Christmas story. Eve was remembering the questions from her baptism in October. They were imitating what they had heard and seen in worship.

Little girls imitate the work and play of mothers as well as other women. It is by imitating women that little girls develop models for valid roles for grown up women. Basically, they discern what they can be when they grow up. Daily, my girls observe me as I model my faith and spirituality. Weekly,

they hear the voice of the Reverend Cathy Jamieson-Ogg as she preaches the word at our church.

While in seminary, Kenda Dean, (at that time a graduate student at Princeton Theological Seminary) shared this advice with me. "Expect to lead in worship. You may view yourself as the youth minister or children's minister, but the girls in your congregation need to see you. They need to hear what you have to say about God. They need to know that you are a minister just like all the other ministers who are in the pulpit."

I don't know if either of my girls will be called to preach, but I know they are informed and active worship participants. I know it matters that they experience female leadership in worship. And I am thankful for those women who embrace their call and step up to the pulpit.
